



A MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear friends.

One crucial marker of a maturing intellect is the ability to hold conflicting truths. Learning to do this successfully is a key skill for thriving in pluralistic environments, be that Stanford, Hillel, or our broader society. It is an honor to support young adults on their journeys of intellectual, spiritual, and identity formation. As an institution, we also stretch to hold conflicting truths. Held in tension with each other, they shape the reality within which Hillel pursues our vision to inspire emerging leaders, connect every student to meaningful community, and ensure the sustainability of the Jewish future.

As Hillel's closest supporters, we want to share with you that this year was a study in contrasts. Rather than Dicken's "best of times/worst of times" formula, we prefer the Talmud's wisdom "elu v'elu divrei Elokim chayim/these and these are the words of the living God." This teaching reminds us that wise leaders and strong communities can hold simultaneous conflicting truths.

A question we heard often this year was "Is Stanford a good place to be Jewish?" While the answer is a resounding "Yes!" there is important nuance in the tension between four conflicting truths which shaped our experience on campus in the last year.

1: We experienced a significant increase in antisemitic incidents at Stanford, mostly in the form of graffiti (swastikas) and vandalism (mezuzahs damaged or taken from doors). This is absolutely unacceptable, and the failure to identify any perpetrators is incredibly frustrating. We are glad that Hillel is the first place students turn to when they experience antisemitism, and we want to see many fewer incidents. To this end we are working with partners in several areas of the Stanford administration to address the problem and reverse the trend.

2: This year Stanford University made an extraordinary reckoning with its own historic antisemitism, specifically in terms of admissions. As the result of the report of the Presidential Task Force on Jewish Life, Stanford President Marc Tessier Lavigne acknowledged and apologized for the university's past behavior and committed to meaningful steps to address its impact today. This includes the incorporation of education about Jewish identity and antisemitism in the University's diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) work, the formation of a Jewish Advisory Council, and a commitment to strengthening the relationship between Stanford and Hillel. This year, the Stanford Alumni Association also launched the Stanford Jewish Alumni Network (S-JAN). If you are an eligible alum, please join!

3: Despite the challenges of Truth #1 and the awful impact of the pandemic on their college experience and personal development, more students than ever are connecting with Hillel and campus Jewish life. Of the approximately 600 Jewish undergrads at Stanford, 94% took a class, shared a meal, celebrated Shabbat, or had coffee with a Hillel staff member last year, and 32% of them did this 6 or more times, or traveled with us to Israel, Poland, Argentina, or NYC. Of the approximately 1200 Jewish graduate students and post-docs, 40% connected with Hillel, and more than 100 Israeli grad students and their families are part of the thriving Israeli@Stanford community. These stats represent more than 1000 students actively engaged in their Jewish lives through Hillel this year, at 300 events or programs.

4: Inflation and shifting donor priorities are making the work of raising the money to fund all of this excellence harder than ever, but you can be our heroes and turn this around. Inflation-related costs increased 10% last year. If you are reading this, you are likely already a Hillel supporter. Might you consider being a Hillel hero? If you are in a position to increase your annual gift, 2023-24 would be an amazing year to do this. Or consider a multi-year gift to help us engage a new rabbi. Finally, if you are thinking about retirement or estate planning, consider including Hillel at Stanford as a beneficiary, which is an incredible way to ensure that the future of Jewish life at Stanford is your legacy for generations to come.

These and these are the words of the living God...Jewish college students need our support more than ever and this is a great time to be Jewish at Stanford. Thank you for your partnership in this whole and holy enterprise.

Planning events with the other members of the JSA board has truly been the highlight of our Stanford experience, and we are thrilled to pass the baton to the next generation of JSA leaders.
